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CONFERENCE: Autumn 2020 - How will it all work?

Due to the current restrictions on large gatherings, the Annual Conference cannot take place in its usual format. GPEW are therefore planning an Extraordinary Autumn Online Conference with the usual exciting programme of fringes, panels, meetings, workshops, elections, plenaries and voting. Some dates and times are to be confirmed, but the outline schedule is as follows:

Extraordinary Online Autumn Conference 2020

Friday 2 and Saturday 3 October	Fringes, panels, hustings and meetings
Monday 5 - Friday 9 October (evenings)	Workshops on motions
Saturday 10 and Sunday 11 October	Plenaries, hustings and voting

Green party policy is made by its members and voted for at the conference. We hope that the move online will enable women who may not have previously been able to attend because of work or family commitments, to have an opportunity to participate.

We urge you to get involved if you can, as only a small percentage of members traditionally attend the conference, which of course means that policy is ultimately decided on by a very few members.

Members have to book a place to join the green Party Autumn Conference. Bookings will open at the end of August.



CONFERENCE: How Green Party Policy is Made


Motions to amend or add to Green Party policies at the Autumn conference have been put forward already by members. You can log in to the members' space and see them [here](#). However there will not be enough time during the conference to discuss all of the motions. Some motions are accredited, which means that they are likely to be discussed at conference, but there are also unaccredited motions which will only be considered if time allows. Because these unaccredited motions are less likely to be heard, members are given the opportunity to vote in a prioritisation ballot to select the ones that they would most like to see discussed. To participate in the prioritisation ballot, just rank the motions in the order of importance to you. Those with the highest votes have more chance of being discussed.

CONFERENCE: Reaffirming Women's Rights motion not accredited to a C motion

Green Party Women are disappointed that despite consulting our membership widely, and also seeking advice from Mick Gregg as the interim Policy Development Co-ordinator, our Reaffirming Women's Rights Motion was not accredited. This means that, due to time constraints, there is less likelihood that the motion will be heard, despite it being the FOURTH time it is being presented to the conference. GPEX Campaigns Co-ordinator Resignation - Caro New

For years, the Green Party has been wary of talking about climate chaos, believing that, far from bringing in supporters and increasing our vote, it would be "death on the doorstep". Evidence now suggests otherwise. People are looking to the Green Party to provide leadership and are bemused by our silence.

In Autumn 2018, Caroline New and Britta Goodman were elected to GPEX as job-share Campaign Co-ordinators. They drew up a campaign - Zero Carbon Now - that could be run with minimal funding and maximum reach. While the details were being argued over on GPEX, Bristol Green Councillor Carla Denyer got a motion passed - unanimously - by the City Council declaring a Climate Emergency and setting a target for reaching net zero carbon by 2030. This was followed by similar motions from many other Councils. The Green Party was caught on the back foot.

Fast forward to October 2019, national Conference in Newport. Following endless meetings and argument over detail, the Action on Climate Emergency (ACE) campaign was finally launched.

Local ACE actions were going well, but the GPEW leadership failed to take advantage of the general election in December 2019 to showcase our commitment to putting fighting climate change at the forefront of our campaigns. Caro's conclusion is that GPEX effectively sabotaged a campaign that they had initially agreed by repeatedly putting it on the back burner. This left other campaigners, such as XR, to move into the space that we had mapped out. This left her feeling that her only option was to resign from GPEX and take her campaigning energies elsewhere. 

28 OCT 2020 - The Cut by Hibo Wardere



Imagine for a moment that you are 6-years-old and you are woken in the early hours, bathed and then dressed in rags before being led down to an ominous looking tent at the end of your garden. And there, you are subjected to the cruellest cut, ordered by your own mother. Forced down on a bed, her legs held apart, Hibo Wardere was made to undergo female genital cutting, a process so brutal, she nearly died.

Eloquent and searingly honest, this is Hibo's memoir which promises not only to tell her remarkable story but also to shed light on a medieval practice that's being carried out in the 21st century, right on our doorstep. FGM in the UK has gone undocumented for too long and now that's going to change. Devastating, empowering and informative, this book brings to life a clash of cultures at the heart of contemporary society and shows how female genital mutilation is a very British problem.
